Stain School: Reweaving ... next steps

Last issue, "Fabrics with a texture provide the best surface for an invisible weave. A good weaver can also restore pin-stripes and prints."

What Fabrics Do NOT Reweave Well?

If textures provide the best canvas for an "invisible" weave, then flat surfaces such as silk, chiffon, cotton and rayon are the worst or most challenging. Gabardine, which is technically a "twill," can also present challenges to even the best reweavers. The result often looks like a faint cross: still better than the hole or tear, but not usually invisible.

Moth & Insect Holes: The Challenge

A hole from insect damage requires a different approach than a hole or tear from a sharp object. A trained eye can usually discern the difference:

- An insect hole is usually imperfect and more jagged
- There may be other holes or weakened areas close by
- The garment held to the light shows partially "eaten" areas

Assuming that the holes are the result of insect damage and, given the expense of reweaving, the garment should be drycleaned *before* reweaving even one hole, in case other holes are revealed during cleaning. This way, you have not invested \$45 to learn that 3 more holes have surfaced.
